




DAY FIVE

On Saturday 11th March 2023, 80 Chapel-en-le-Frith High School students and 8 members of staff set off on their winter sport adventure to Bardonecchia, Italy. We landed at a very wet Chambery airport and made our transfer to the Olympic Village in Bardonecchia.


Day one in resort consisted of ski fit and introductions to our instructors. We hit the slopes at 10am and began our lessons. Teacher's Strikes:

Questions and Answers?

WHAT IS A STRIKE?

When a group of workers are unhappy about an aspect of their job (usually pay, workload or conditions) they can ask their employer to improve things. If their employer refuses, then the workers can refuse to go to work to force their employer to meet their demands. This is called a strike. A strike is usually a last resort when negotiations have failed. Neither side really wants a strike as the workers don't get paid for the days they strike, and the employer is disrupted.

WHAT IS A UNION?

People acting on their own are not very powerful. People acting together are a lot more powerful. A union is a group of workers who act together to be more powerful. Think of it like a club for everyone who does the same job. Everyone in the union pays a membership fee to be in the club. That money is used to pay people to negotiate for fair pay and better working conditions for the workers. The union also supports you with advice if you get into a disagreement with your employer. Unions help to stop bad employers taking advantage of their employees.

WHY IS IT SOME TEACHERS AND NOT ALL OF THEM?

There is more than one union for teachers and the voting on whether or not to strike went differently in the different unions. In the NEU teaching union, more than half the members voted and voted overwhelmingly to strike. In the NASUWT union even though the majority of the people that voted said they wanted to strike they aren't legally allowed to do so because less than 50% of the people in the union voted. Some teachers feel very passionately and changed union so they could strike. Some teachers are not part of a union or disagree with the strikes.

HOW DOES THIS END?

I can't predict the future; however, most strikes end with a bit of compromise on both sides. Usually, the employer agrees to some of the demands and the employees go back to work because they are desperate to be paid again.

Over the last few weeks many students have asked me questions about the teacher strikes. This is my best go at answering some of them.

CAN ANYONE GO ON STRIKE? WHAT ABOUT STUDENTS?

Anyone can choose not to turn up for work but being in a union gives you protection from being sacked for doing so. There are rules to make it legal. Everyone in the union is asked to vote and if a large enough number of people do so and vote 'yes' then there will be a strike. The rules are slightly different depending on which job you do and which union you are in. In theory school children can't strike because they are not employed to go to school. You also aren't in a union.

WHAT ARE THE STRIKES TRYING TO ACHIEVE?

This dispute is between teachers and the government. It is not a dispute between teachers and the management of our school. Most of the news coverage has been about money but it's actually a lot more complicated than that. Reason One, pay: Inflation is the change in how much things cost. Most of the time this goes up and things get more expensive. Every year for more than 10 years teachers' pay has risen by less than inflation. This means that, compared to how much things cost, experienced teachers are paid about 23% less than they were in 2007. Teachers are annoyed that they are not getting what they expected to when they trained to become teachers. Reason two, funding schools: You might have seen that experienced teachers were given a 5% pay rise this year. However, the government didn't actually give the school any more money to pay for this. This means that we have to save money in other ways to pay for this, like making class sizes bigger so we can employ less staff. This increases staff stress, workload and reduces the quality of the education we can deliver. Reason three, teacher recruitment: the government has failed to recruit enough new teachers. For example, nationally, 1 in 8 children are set work and assessed in Maths by someone who is not qualified in the subject. Graduates state stress, excessive work and stagnant pay as putting them off. Reason three, teacher retention: many teachers are leaving education for the same reason people aren't joining the profession. 1 in 3 teachers leave the profession within the first 5 years. All of these issues can be solved by giving schools more money. This is why many teachers are on strike. They are losing their pay because they care about your education.

Second national finals for both these athletes! Zak Kelly also had a fine run and he is also reserve for the National finals.

All students performed very well with over 420 participants taking part in this prestigious competition and the High Peak teams finished in the top three, in five out of the six races; a huge well done to everyone!

EASTER SIMNEL CAKERECIPE

CHICKPEA BLONDIE RECIPE

Ingredients

• 6 oz margarine

- · 6 oz sugar
- · 8 oz plain flour
- · 1 ½ level tsp baking powder
- · 3 eggs
- · 1 lb mixed dried fruit
- · 2 oz cherries
- · 2 oz peel
- · 2 oz chopped almonds
- · 2 oz split almonds
- · 2 tbsp milk
- · 1 tsp spice

Instructions

- 1. Cream the margarine and sugar together until soft and light. Add the beaten egg. Sieve dry ingredients together. Chop a few of the almonds and split the others.
- 2. Mix the chopped almonds, floured cherries, fruit, and peel together.
- 3. Stir in the flour and enough milk to make a slow dropping consistency, then lastly add the fruit.
- 4. Put half of the mixture into an 8-inch tin and cover with a small circle of marzipan, then add the rest of the mixture on top.
- 5. Bake for 2-2 ¼ hours (only 1 ¼ in fan assisted) in the middle of a very moderate oven at around 160 degrees Celsius to around 180 degrees Celsius. Leave in oven for a short while after because of marzipan.
- 6. When baked and cool brush the top of the cake with egg white or sieved apricot jam.
- 7. Cover with another circle of marzipan. Brush with egg white and brown under low grill.
- 8. Decorate with mini eggs (optional).

Please note that I got this recipe off the internet, and it did not provide exact amounts for the ingredients. I cannot help this fact. Sorry.


Ingredients

- •1 can of chickpeas
- · Almond butter
- · Eggs vegan alternatives don't work I'm afraid
- · White sugar and brown sugar- for a caramel taste
- · White chocolate chunks
- · Salt
- · Baking powder
- · Oil
- · Vanilla extract

Instructions

- 1. First, start off by pulsing the drained and rinsed chickpeas in a food processor until finely ground.
- 2. Add the almond butter, oil, vanilla extract, then pulse until smooth. Add the eggs.
- 3. Mix the dry ingredients the sugars, salt and baking powder. Do this separately to the other ingredients.
- 4. Line an 8 or 9 inch square baking pan with parchment paper, then pour in the mixture
- 5. Bake until the top begins to brown, and the sides are firm a toothpick may still come out sticky that's ok.

In 1483, Edward IV dies of a stroke, leaving his son to take over. This was Edward V. He was unfortunately twelve years old at the time, so his uncle Richard of Gloucester was appointed as the Protector. Edward was moved to his residence at the Tower of London, where he was soon joined by his brother, Richard of Shrewsbury. It was here that they spent the rest of their lives.

They were seen less and less of the tower grounds, until they disappeared completely. Richard of Gloucester Had seized the throne prior to this and was now Richard III. It is most likely that they were murdered by the orders of Richard, but the truth is unknown. The bones of two children were found under the stairs of the Tower in 1674. After further examination, these bones were identified as the Princes, but some of the bones were later identified as animal bones and the skeletons were shown to be incomplete in 1933. The bones were interred as the Princes in Westminister Abbey, but DNA testing permission has been denied.

Visitors have claimed to have seen the ghost of two children walking the corridors of the tower and people believe them to be the Princes walking to their bed and ultimately to their death. But it is unknown for certain who they are.

So there you have it. A murder mystery that may remain a mystery forever...

CHESTER ZOO ARE ECSTATIC TO INTRODUCE FIVE NEW ADDITIONS TO THEIR COLLECTION

ZOO BORNS

2023 has got off to a flying start for Chester Zoo with the arrival of some bundles of joy. First to arrive this year was, Jeff a Western Chimpanzee. Mum Zee Zee safely delivered the youngster after a 8 month gestation period.

The next January baby is a Goodfellows tree kangaroo, yet to be named, is the first baby tree kangaroo toe every be borna t Chester Zoo and will hopefully boost decreasing numbers in the wild.

January saw yet another two species successfully give birth with a baby Coquerel's Sifaka and twin Sumatran tiger cubs.

The rare Coquerel's Sifaka was born to parent Beatrice and Elliot as part of a vital new conservation breeding programme, designed to protect the critically endangered lemur from extinction. Chester Zoo are the first zoo in Europe to successfully breed this critically endangered primate.

The tiny Sumatram tiger twins were born to first time parents Kasarna and Dash. Just 350 Sumatran tigers are thought to remain in the wild, making thm one of the world's rarest tiger subspecies. They're listed as critically endangered by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN). That means birth is a vital step in the con-
