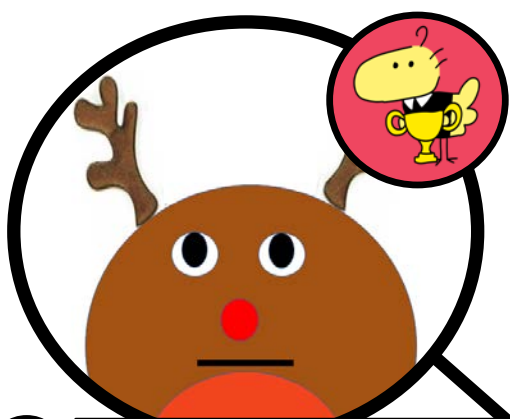

Chapel-en-le-Frith High School held its inaugural Sports Presentation

Evening this term in an event designed to celebrate the sporting achievements of students.

Mr Henshall, Head of PE, opened the evening by welcoming students and their family and thanking colleagues from several different roles within school who support the wide range of extracurricular activities the school offers.

Compère for the evening was Mr Turner, who explained how the event would operate and introduced a video highlight reel of last year's sporting endeavours. Mr Turner then had the privilege of presenting the event's special guest. There were a few teasers on the departments Twitter account (@ChapelHighPE) as to who the guest may be. With over 250 appearances for Manchester United, over 220 for Sunderland, and 118 international caps, we had the great pleasure of welcoming former Premier League footballer, John O'Shea.



O'Shea spoke at the awards evening, talking through his career and what made it so successful. He told students how important it is to work with their teachers, and ask for support where required. He mentioned the role Sir Alex Ferguson played in developing him in to not just a professional footballer, but in to a great person. John then stayed around to hand out the awards, and have pictures with students and their family.

The awards kicked off with 'Most Improved' and 'Player of the Year' in a range of sports including football, netball, cricket, athletics, cross country and many more. Students in year 10 were awarded 'colours' in certain sports for their attitude and commitment to training and playing for school over three years.

The evening finished with individual awards where Dylan Moore and Livvi Phipps each won 'Sportsperson of the Year'. Sporty siblings Flossie and Campbell Johnson won the 'Robert Drabble Sports Personality of the Year' for key stage 3. Tom Pollard and Eva Berry won 'SPOTY' for key stage 4, and there was a 'Sporting Recognition' award, sponsored by Nestle Waters, for year 8 student Peter Berriman. The penultimate award was 'Street Crane Team of the Year' which went to our amazing Inter Girls' Cross Country team who competed in the national finals of the ESSA cross country cup. The last award, sponsored by Tarmac, was Outstanding Contribution to School Sport and went to Ben Pheasey for his overall impact on sport during his time at Chapel.

We had a truly fantastic evening celebrating the success of our students and look forward to making this an annual event. Thanks to our colleagues who made the event possible and to our sponsors for supporting us in getting the event up and running.

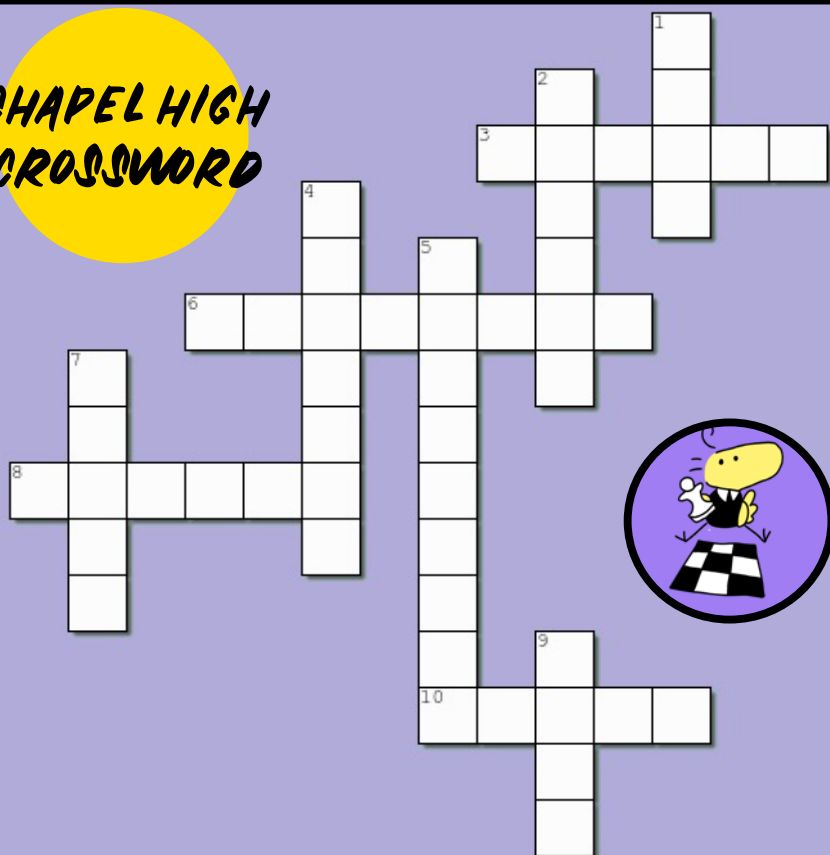

This would be helpful because many soldiers suffered from PTSD during the war. Many players would encourage young people to take up football as a hobby. As Pele once said "Success is no accident. It is hard work, perseverance, learning, studying, sacrifice and most of all, love of what you are doing or learning to do." To achieve dreams, you have to work hard and give priorities. A good saying showing this is "The only place where success comes before work is in the dictionary". There are many benefits of joining a football club is that you make new friends that have at least one similar

interest to you – football! Even if you don't join a club, playing football can build self-confidence, improve social skills and give you greater focus. The next performance in our calendar is 'Love 2 Perform' on Wednesday 29th March, we hope to see you there!

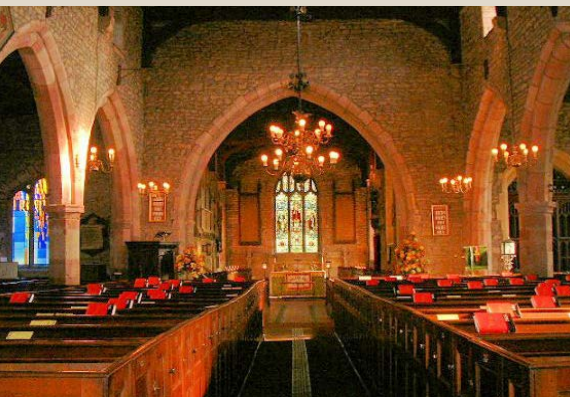
Reverse Advent Calendar

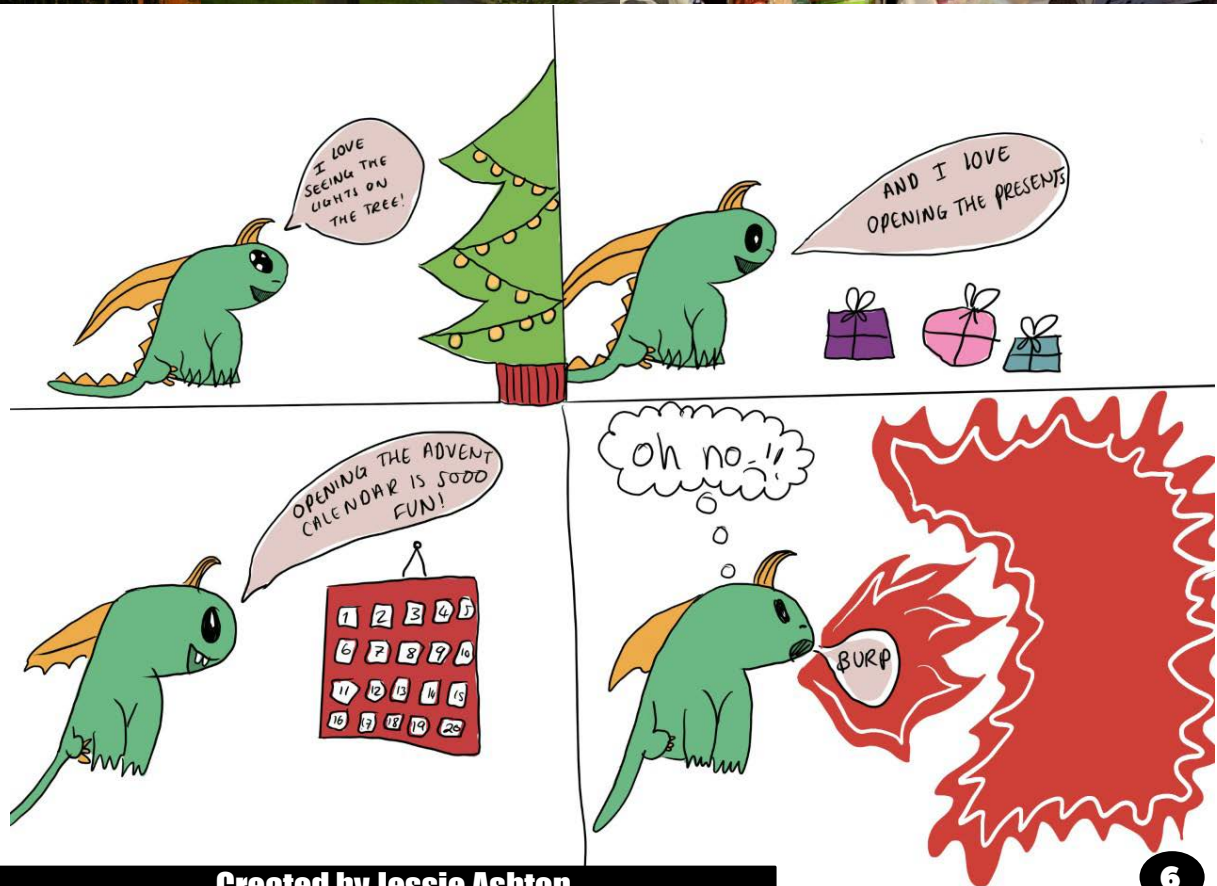
food bank 'Chapel Good Neighbour'. Thank you to all the students and people at home that

MEET YOUR CAREERS TEAM!

We are your **Careers Team** here in school. We're here to give you help and advice about courses, jobs and training so you can plan your future and think about what you would like to do when you leave Chapel High. We love to talk to students about their plans and can provide you with information about:

- Courses at college
- Apprenticeships and training
- Application forms and CVs
- Interview techniques
- University education
- Open days and careers events
- Plus lots more!

Don't forget about the Careers Drop-in sessions which run every week. There's no need to make an appointment, you can just turn up. You can pop in to ask a quick question or get more detailed advice if you need it:

CAREERS DROP-IN!

WHEN? Every Wednesday and Thursday.

WHERE? The Careers Hub (next to Art 2)

WHY? Come along to find out more about courses, jobs and careers. Ask questions and pick up information to take home.

WHO? Open to all students.

GUIDE TO CAREERS INTERVIEWS

Every student will get the opportunity to have a Careers Interview with Mrs Brannelly. Most of you will do this in Year 10.

WHAT IS A CAREERS INTERVIEW?

It is a 40-minute appointment with our school Careers Advisor, Mrs Brannelly, which is designed to help you think about your future and what you might like to do when you leave school. If you have a particular job or career in mind, Mrs Brannelly will talk through the different ways you could get there. This might include looking at courses at college and/or university, apprenticeships or other types of training. You will learn how to research courses and careers, which websites to visit for more information and you might pick up leaflets and materials to take home.

BUT WHAT IF I DON'T KNOW WHAT I WANT TO DO IN THE FUTURE?

Don't worry if you don't know what you want to do when you leave school – lots of students don't, and this is completely normal. The appointment is your opportunity to start thinking about life after Chapel High, to talk about the things you enjoy doing and the different options available to you. You will get support with making decisions and advice about what to do next.

WHAT HAPPENS DURING THE CAREERS INTERVIEW?

You will explore the different options available to you after school, find out where to look for information and how to research the options. You will also talk about any setbacks or difficulties and come up with strategies to help you overcome these. You will think about back-up plans if things don't work out with your first-choice plans.

DO I NEED TO DO ANY PREPARATION BEFORE MY CAREERS INTERVIEW?

You don't have to prepare anything before your interview, but it could really help if you:

- Write down what you want to discuss in the interview, including any questions you have.
- Discuss your careers ideas with others e.g. parents and friends.
- Make a list of things you are good at and the activities you enjoy inside and outside of school.
- If you know what you want to do in the future, you could do a bit of research online to find out about courses and careers you are interested in.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER THE CAREERS INTERVIEW?

Mrs Brannelly will send you a copy of your Careers Action Plan. This is a document which contains details of everything you talked about in the interview, including any actions you need to take such as researching a college course online or going along to an open day. You should keep this safe.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

You now have a plan of action to follow and this will link with other careers activities in school. Every student will get the opportunity to have a Careers Interview, but if you feel you need more help and advice after your initial appointment, you can request another appointment at pupil reception. And don't forget about the Careers Drop-in in the Careers Hub every Wednesday and Thursday lunchtime – you can come along to ask questions and pick up more information (no appointment needed).

Year 9 students were invited to take part in a National Languages Competition run by GCHQ – the UK's intelligence, security and cyber agency.

A team of four keen linguistics put their language skills to the test and battled it out to solve language puzzles over the course of a week to try and win the trophy. The competition was fierce, with over 650 schools taking part and over 3000 teams entered. After an outstanding team effort by Saffron, Toby, Hannah and Millie, their team placed 121st overall out of 3000. They used their code-breaking skills to solve a variety of language-based puzzles including a European languages Dingbats, Only Connect etymologies, and Lost in Translation challenges. The challenges involved working in many unfamiliar languages, including Afrikaans and Welsh! Our students proved themselves to be excellent linguists with impressive motivation, dedication and puzzle-solving skills. We are very proud of them all and wouldn't be surprised if there were some future spies in our midst!

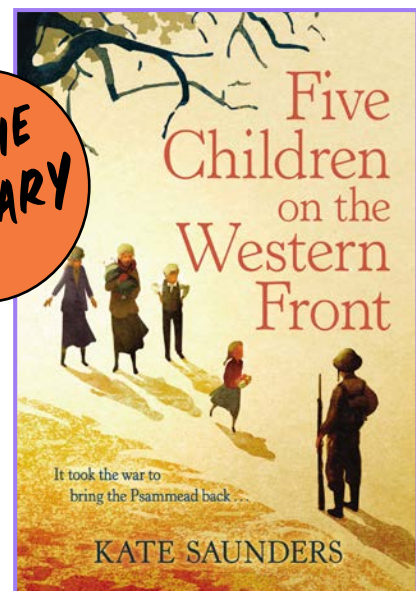

YEAR 11 MOCK FEEDBACK



We're very aware of the fact that the year is passing very fast; this term we had the year 11 mock exams. Here is some advice from current year 11s, reflecting on their exam experience and preparation:

"Revise! Revise! Revise! The biggest bit of advice I could give to myself is to revise when you get new information. When you learn something, make a flashcard for that information, which will include all the key notes and anything that you think will be included in an exam. Don't write everything from your book, word-for-word, just any key points. The second thing, and arguably the most important one is to not burn yourself out and give yourself breaks. Your brain can only concentrate for 20 minutes, so doing 20-minute intervals of revision with breaks in-between is the most sufficient and helpful way to revise. Have hope in yourself and you will do great."

"Revise! Half an hour every night! Also don't do longer than that because you'll get burned out. Make sure you get a good night's sleep and pay attention in class. Learn your quotes!"

"My mock exam experience started off as overwhelming and stressful but after the first few exams I found which ways were effective to revise from. I hadn't done consistent revision from the start of the year so I was in the situation of revising a whole year's worth of work in a few days – for my real GCSEs I need to start doing consistent revision and if I could change the past, I would've started revising earlier. The revision tool which saved me was watching topic summaries on YouTube, walk throughs of past papers and then completing papers."

"Don't stress! As easy as it is to say, don't worry because after you've done them, you'll scold yourself for panicking over nothing. Revise for at least 20-40 minutes each night – every night and I promise it'll pay off."

Revision Cards!

HAVE YOU EVER WANTED TO GET BETTER GRADES, BUT CANNOT BE BOTHERED TO WRITE THINGS OUT REPETITIVELY?

Well, now you can know how to get good grades, whilst also beating your friends! There are two different ways of playing so you can revise however you want:

The **first** mode is made to be even more revision whist making it. For this game, make your flashcards so that they are in groups. It would be best for around 4 cards having the same answer. Shuffle all the cards together and deal them into one pile for each person playing. The game works like snap, but instead of matching cards, you try and match answers, with the questions on the top. Slide the cards from your pile to the center when it is your turn, being careful not to cheat by looking on the back.

The **second** game you can play with your flashcards needs the cards to have all different answers. They can have the same answers but it is way easier. Deal all the cards out to each player, so the answers are on the bottom. Make sure all players start at the same time. As quick as you can, go through the deck of cards by answering the question on the front of the card. The first person to get through all their questions win the game.

FLASHCARD TIPS

- Put one question onto each card.
- Make them colorful, eg. use highlighters.
- Write them out yourself and do not type them so it becomes muscle memory.

PT2: a cog falls out of the TV "GOD" Theodore says and the cog falls into the toaster and a portal pops out and wakes Craig up.

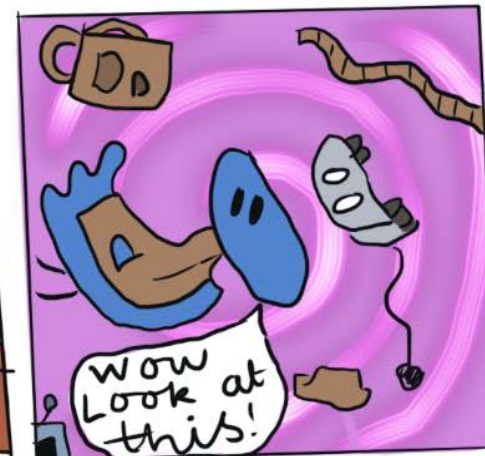
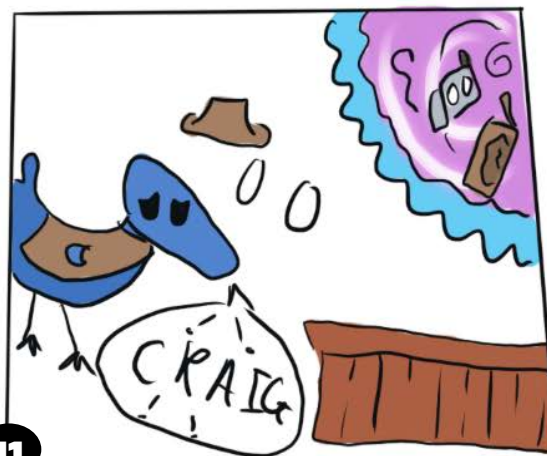
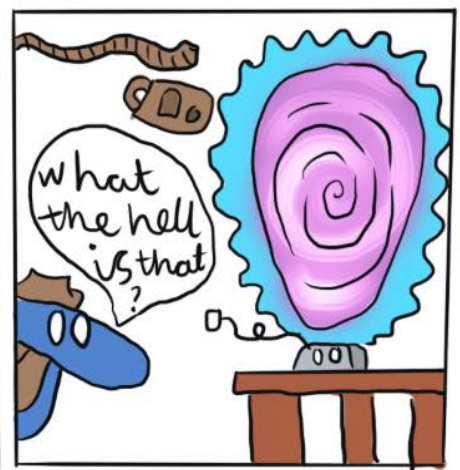
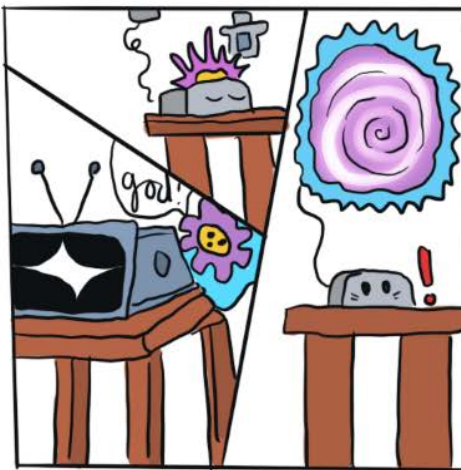

CHAPEL HIGH ALUMNI INTERVIEW

Q. What was your high school life like? What were the highs and lows, and what qualifications/GCSEs did you get from it?

High school life for me was pretty good and I enjoyed most of my time there. Revising for exams was probably a low as it was hard work for a while- but it definitely paid off! In my GCSEs I got: 1 A*, 9 As and 2 Bs and my options were: Triple Science, German, History and Catering.

Q. What have you done in education and work since then? What subjects did you have to take to get that job, what subjects helped you or would have helped you in this field of work?

After high school I went to college and kept my options fairly open as I wasn't sure what I wanted to do afterwards. At college I studied: Chemistry, Biology, History and English Literature (AS). I left college with AAC in my A-levels (Chemistry, History and Biology) and a B in AS English literature. I then went on to study an integrated Master's degree in Chemistry (MChem) at the University of Leeds (2015-2019) and I graduated with a 1st. Picking science subjects helped me as I needed 2 science subjects at A-level to even be considered for a chemistry degree- so I would

recommend having some subjects that could help you down a particular pathway.

I was also very close to choosing a degree in history, so the fairly broad range of topics at A-level helped me keep my future options open!

Choosing a chemistry degree helped me with my PhD, but they usually ask for a science degree, and you don't have to stick to your particular area of science in research- I work with chemists, biologists, physicists and computer scientists! But doing a science degree gives you lots of useful skills that you can apply to many areas!

Q. What is your current career or study focus?

My current career is that I am a final year PhD student (4th year) in atmospheric chemistry at the University of York. My PhD research involves investigating emissions of unregulated pollutants from vehicles and other pollutant sources in urban areas. I am particularly interested in the effect of pollutants on air quality, which can impact human health and the environment.

Q. What was your favourite subject in high school? Does it match with your job, or have your interests changed?

My favourite subject in high school was actually history! My interests have slightly changed, but I am still interested in history in my free time.

Q. What other activities or milestones have you done since education and high school, e.g., Travel, buy a house etc.

I graduated with a 1st class degree from my university! During my PhD I published a 1st-author paper from my research and won a prize for academic excellence at my university!

6. Did you do any other activities in school, and did they help you on your CV? e.g., Duke of Edinburgh

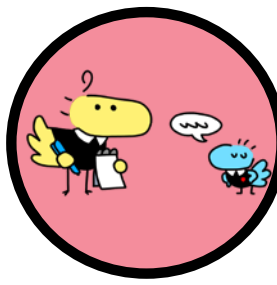
I did bronze Duke of Edinburgh and played netball! I think it did help as additional activities/hobbies can make you stand out from other candidates at college/university.

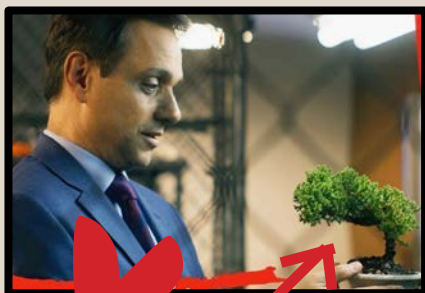

What is Bonsai I hear you ask? Well it certainly isn't what you will have seen recently on the latest season of Cobra Kai.

WHAT IS BONSAI?

A bonsai is a shrub or tree in a pot. It is that simple. Modern bonsai is practised around the world and many of the trees in collections globally are considered works of living art.

WHY DID IT START?

In ancient China during the Song dynasty, Chinese villagers would collect interesting looking trees and plants from the top of mountains and plant them in ceramic containers. The trees would symbolise the ability to adapt and overcome struggle. Their owners would admire the ability of the trees to survive in harsh environments.



INTERESTED? WHERE DO I START?

A common misconception is that bonsai are grown from special dwarf seeds. Bonsai are just normal trees which have been trained and styled to look like a large tree in miniature. You can start a bonsai tree from hedge trees bought from the local garden centre or nursery.

Lots of British species of trees are great for bonsai and there are literally hundreds of different species you can turn into a beautiful bonsai.

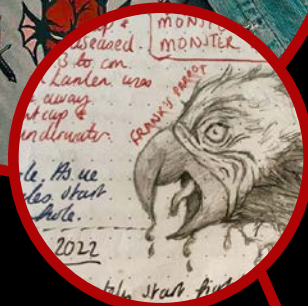

Stranger Things season four came out this year, and what a momentous TV triumph that was. As well as Eddie Munson shredding Metallica's 'Master of Puppets', Eddie also revised the show's starting point – dungeons and dragons (DND). Google defines DND as 'a fantasy role-playing game set in an imaginary world based loosely on medieval myth'; Stranger Things really highlighted the best moments of DND, one of the best parts being Erica rolling a natural 20 to defeat Vecna at the beginning of season 4!

I have been playing DND since 2019, before then I was completely oblivious to how amazing this game actually is. It started when I moved back to Buxton after finishing University, and my friends invited me round to see whether I'd like to join; it can take years to finish a DND campaign and they were already a year into theirs. However, after watching them for 5 hours, briefly role-playing a golden dragon, rolling my first twenty-sided-dice and landing on a natural 20 on my first roll (that is the best roll you can get - ERICA MOMENT!), I was hooked.

DND is perfect for escapism. Every Sunday I delve into this illusive fantasy world, with a character I have mustered up in my brain and I explore all these crazy places, simply using my imagination. I get to fight monsters, explore forgotten realms, and best of all I get to spend a few hours with my friends every week. One of my friends, Rick, once said – 'You're either in a dungeon fighting a dragon, smelling the damp of the cave and feeling the cold on your skin or, you're in a kitchen sat round a table staring at your friends.' You have to use your imagination and let go of your inhibitions and just enjoy it - cause if you do, you'll end up having so much fun.

If you're interested in learning how to play, 'Dungeons and Dragons' have a YouTube channel where you can find free tutorials on how to roll a character and where to start! In addition, there is a podcast called 'Critical Role' on Youtube which is a recorded DND campaign played by voice actors, it's become quite the phenomenon – this podcast is entertaining and can help your understanding of how the game is played. There is also 'The Player's Handbook', which is the starting manual for the lore of DND and teaches you how to roll characters, although the DND books can be a little expensive. As an alternative there is a free app called 'DND Beyond' that is a tool to help play the game and it helps you to roll your characters and can automatically load your starting stats.

I recommend DND to anyone who loves making up stories and RPG games. I can hand-on-heart say that it has 10000000% enriched my life.

2. Then stir in sugar.
3. Beat egg and golden syrup together and add to the mixture.
4. Rest in fridge for 15 minutes then roll out to just under 1cm thickness (be careful not to roll too thin) and cut into desired shapes.
5. Cook at 180C on greaseproof paper lined trays for 12-15 minutes.

SPICY TOMATO SOUP RECIPE



Ingredients:

- 1 onion
- 500 ml water
- 1 carrot
- 1 stock cube
- 1 Potato
- ½ x 5ml spoon dried chilli flakes
- 1x can chopped tomatoes (400g)
- 1 x 15ml spoon tomato puree

Method

1. Prepare the vegetables:
 - Peel and slice the onion
 - Top and tail; then peel and slice the carrot
 - Peel and cut the potato into 8
2. Put all the ingredients into a saucepan.
3. Stir everything together, bring to the boil (high) and then simmer (low heat) for 20 minutes.
4. Ladle the mixture into the liquidiser and blend until smooth.



Top Tips

- Place a cloth over the liquidiser to stop any soup from splashing out.
- Use a range of different vegetables, e.g., leeks, peppers, mushrooms (try and use the vegetables that are in season)
- Serve with wholegrain bread
- Use different herbs and spices, e.g., basil, mixed herbs, paprika
