We are always enormously proud of the achievements of our sporting students and this term is no different. We have had a range of success at local, county, and national level. We are immensely proud of our young leaders in both year 8 and 9 who have supported many primary events; they have been excellent ambassadors for the school. Thank you!

OSCAR SHAW, CYCLING

Year 9 student Oscar Shaw took part in the British Schools Cycling Association Championships for Derbyshire representing Chapel-en-le-Frith High School. Oscar came 3rd in the 10-mile time trial. This was followed by the circuit race which saw Oscar break away with another rider and then outsprinting him for the win. An excellent achievement, Oscar!

CRICKET

Our u15 cricket team travelled to Trent College for the u15 T20 County Cup finals day where we played the hosts in the semi-final. Unfortunately, we lost the semi-final, but this meant a play off for third place. Captain Zak Kelly won the toss and elected to bowl first, Joe Cooper was pick of the bowlers with two wickets as Chapel reduced West Park to 163 in their twenty overs. Zak (69) and Joe (68) opened the batting for Chapel and put on a hundred run partnership to help the team defeat West Park in 17 overs and finish third in the County Cup.

The u14 cricket team, made up of students in year 7 and 8, unfortunately finished fourth in their County Cup finals day. After an excellent quarter final win away to Dronfield, the team came up short in both the semi-final and the play off. This team is growing and will hopefully have a good chance in next year's competition.

GOLF

Three of our year 11 students, Ollie W, Fraser H and Ollie S travelled to the home of England Golf, Woodhall Spa for the English Schools' Golf Team Championships. During the practise round, the boys made notes on the course, planning their approach for the competition the following day. Putting was the challenge on tricky, quick greens.

Competition day saw the boys in complete focus mode, as they arrived 2 hours before their tee time to warm up for the day. Putting, chipping, and driving was the order for warm up, with the boys making sure they were ready to take on the challenge.

The team played some excellent golf and managed to achieve a Stableford score of 71 points, putting them tied 6th place out of 632 schools nationwide. Ollie Wong finished an impressive 3rd in the individual standings.

NETBALL

The netball finals were all held in the summer following a successful season for all our teams. The future is bright as both our year 7 and 8 teams won the area finals backed up by excellent performances by our B and C teams too. It was lovely to see all our year 7 netball club playing in the tournament on one of the hottest days!

SPORTS HALL AT HLET ICS

Just before the outdoor season started our sports hall teams took part in the county finals following their success in the High Peak competition. In some very tight competitions, the teams came away with 2nd, 3rd, and 4th places.....a great end to the term!



It has been a busy summer with most events enjoying the warmth and sunshine that June brought. The school teams all performed well at the county round of the ESAA cup, and all four teams progressed to the regional finals. The star performers were the year 8 boys who won the county round and finished runners up in the regional A final; a super achievement. Following this success over twenty students represented the High Peak at the county schools' individual athletics championships in Derby where we won 14 medals including golds for Quaid Sin, Theo Mills Kidals and Ollie Thornhill. Following this event, seven students were selected for the Derbyshire team for the intercounty event in Stoke.

The outstanding individual achievement was from Quaid who qualified to take part in the English Schools' finals in Birmingham in the triple jump. Here he competed against the top athletes in the country at this prestigious event, finishing an excellent 16th.

Several athletes also took part in the Derbyshire Combined events championships and Betty Braithwaite and Quaid both won their respective age groups. Onto Derby for the regional finals and Chapel were well represented with 7 athletes selected for the county team. Excellent performances were achieved by Quaid, Jack Chen, Campbell Johnson and Tessa Cooper. However, the stars of this event were our older students and Ollie won the Midlands title and along with Betty and Flossie Johnson now go onto the national schools' finals at Bedford in September.

Sports Day is fast approaching and hopefully we will see lots of students enjoying their athletics in our annual sporting finale!



INTERVIEW OF ABI DAVIES YEAR 11 LEAVER

Abi was a student at Chapel High School from 2018-2023. This year they completed their GCSE exams and they're on their way to college to further their education. I sat down with Abi to reflect on their experience at Chapel High School. Abi was born with Cerebral Palsy and navigated the school in their motorised wheelchair.

Q: What year did you start at Chapel High School?

A: 5 years ago, that would've been 2018.

Q: Can you remember how you felt when you were anticipating coming to high school?

A: I had mixed feelings about it because I was ready for change, but I knew I was the only student coming here from my primary, so I would have to make new friends, so mixed feelings.

Q: How have you found your experience here?

A – I have enjoyed my time here; I've found that people are really accommodating. Year 7, even though I couldn't get into the caves at Castleton, they took me on the trip and they were planning on taking me to Spain but covid-19 hit, sadly. They had everything in place.

Q: How have you found your lessons at Chapel High?

A: I've enjoyed my lessons and enjoyed working with TA's that I've had the privilege of working with. Also, if TA's aren't in, teachers have printed off resources or written for me so I don't have to worry about anything. It is a really accommodating school.

Q:What advice would you give to somebody coming to Chapel High who has had a similar life experience to you? A: Be as outgoing and open minded as possible, because if you want to do something, they will find a way of getting you there and doing it. The support has been great, I've been given regular support so I've gotten quite close with the TA's that work with me, just embrace the support, they're there to support you and not be an inconvenience.

Q: One thing you're glad you did at school?

A: It's hard to pick one, because I've done so much, but I definitely say engaging in extra-curricular stuff opens up networks for friendships.

Q: What is one thing you would improve about CH school?

A: One thing I would improve is the speed of adaptions that have been made. Only recently, school have pinned the doors back in corridoors but that has been going on since I was in year 6 (6 years ago). Pinning the door back has given me so much more independence and freedom to do what I want at lunch times, on my own. I hope that any accessibility adaptions can be done quicker in the future.

Q: Anything you'd like to add?

A: It's always best to be yourself and face any challenges head on. Don't let fear let you lose out in life.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIE BECIPE

THE BEST DRAWING EQUIPMENT AND TIPS

Written by Max Appleby

Ingredients:

- 200 grams of peanut butter (both crunchy and smooth work)
- 175 grams of caster sugar
- ¼ teaspoon of table salt (not needed if peanut butter is already salted)
- 1 large egg

Method:

Step 1: Heat your oven to 180C and line 2 large baking trays with parchment.

Step 2: Measure the peanut butter and sugar in bowl. Add ¼ tsp fine table salt and mix well with a wooden spoon. Add the egg and mix again until the mixture forms a dough consistency.

Step 3: Break off small walnut-sized chunks of dough and place, well-spaced apart (otherwise they WILL fuse), on the trays. Press the cookies down a bit to flatten. The cookies can now be frozen for 2 months, cook from frozen adding an extra minute or 2 to the cooking time.

Step 4: Bake for 12 minutes, until golden around the edges and paler in the centre. Cool on the trays for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in a cookie jar (or however you store your cookies) for up to 3 days. I really like drawing outside of school and these are some bits of drawing equipment that I recommend for starters:

THIN TIPPED POSCA PENS – they are great for doing the outlines of your drawings.

THICK TIPPED POSCA PENS – they are good for colouring the inside of your drawings.

The POSCA pen colours stand out because once they are dry, they go a very bold matt colour. You can get them in most colours.

Get yourself a **NOTEBOOK**, A3 or A4 notepad. It is good to have a notepad cause its stress relieving and you can put your mind in another dimension and forget about what is going on.

If you have no ideas of what to draw, go to the library and look at the comic section, because they have great ideas for what to draw next. Good inspiration. E.g., I used Marvel as my inspiration because I like Marvel and it is very multi-dimensional.

If you are struggling to find something in a comic book, ask Miss Hibbert for help and she will help you find some how to draw books. These art books teach you the steps of how to draw and then if you keep practicing you will achieve great things of the drawing world.

I draw my favourite things and it makes me look for more things to draw. When I practice, I feel like I improve more because of all the practicing. I find it very stress relieving and would recommend it to anyone that is stressed or just needs to zone out and just think of something you like and just draw it.



The first thing you need to know is that your first few hundred videos are most likely to not get many views. Although- don't let this put you off! The legend himself- Mr. Beast actually talked about this in an interview. Here he explains:

"My first couple of hundred videos did really badly. They only got around 100 views and I didn't make any money from them."

So, what have we learnt from this? – Be resilient! Don't give up if a video doesn't do well – recently I spent 3 hours making a video and it only got 10 views. Yikes!

The next thing you need to know is to be engaging with any fans you get and the comments section. If you reply to a comment kindly, they are more likely to subscribe to you thus growing your channel. If your channel does start to gain subscribers but you don't engage with your fans, you will lose subscribers rapidly. Of course, be careful with who you talk to online and don't start any big convocations.

Penultimately, you should do either a variety of content or do one kind of content. But what did I mean by this? For example, you do a list of things and do a variety of content from Minecraft challenge videos to bottle flips. Or you could do the other extreme and only do Fortnite videos. Both of these have there are positives and negatives. If you have a variety of content lots of different people will see your videos, but probably won't stay with your channel for the other content. If you stay consistent then people will keep watching your videos and stay subscribed, but only a portion of YouTube will see your videos. There are a lot of successful channels that do both: Mr beast does a lot of variety in him videos whereas T Series does only songs. Personally, I have a variety of content, but you can do what you thin 8is best for your channel.

Finally, my final tip is...

To have fun! Make videos that you would enjoy watching and be happy and energetic in your videos.

This is a campaign for Dungeons and Dragons 5th edition to be played by one or two 3rd level characters.

THE POLICE

As the players arrive in town, they are greeted by the local sheriff (you can choose any name if you already have a setting) and are asked if they are busy. The sheriff has a job for the players, and they can go and find more about it at the police station. They reveal the following information:

- The goblin/ Hobgoblin Pirates aboard the galleon known as the dreaded 'Squid Splitter' have abducted an important noble called Deward Crews.
- The first mate and quarter master of the ship enjoy visiting a local tavern (the Black Dagger).
- They know someone at the port who can get a blueprint for the Squid – Splitter and other information about the vessel.
- They can also provide spell scrolls of Disguise Self to make the characters look like they are goblins.

THE BLACK DAGGER

You should describe the tavern as a very dark and gloomy place, frequented by rogues and scoundrels. In the tavern, there should be a barkeep of some kind, some other people drinking, and two shady figures sitting in a corner. These are the two Hobgoblin officers from the Squid – Splitter that the sheriff told the players about earlier. If they are killed now, they are not involved in the fight later.

THE PORT

The port master should have plans of the ship and can tell the players it is moored off the shore, in the middle of the bay. 2 hobgoblins protect a small rowing boat that is used to get to the ship.

THE SHIP

The ship is moored 120ft out to sea. If the players are not disguised as goblins, a cannon gets shot at them as they come in and are noticed. If not, they get advantage on the next skill challenge. On the deck, lots of goblins pour out of the stairs to the lower deck. Ask all players to think of something cinematic to do and roll an appropriate skill. If more than half out of three rolls per character succeed, then all the goblins get killed through the actions of the players, and the players are free to pass through. If they fail, 4 goblins try to fight them.

On the next level down on the ship, there is a group of goblins arguing over who gets the treasure. There is a treasure chest with 50gp per player in the middle of the deck. Players can engage the situation however they like.

On the final level down, there is a person chained to the floor with an ankle chain. As the players come in, he says "ah! Finally, someone has come to rescue me! My name is Deward Crews!" the man is not lying, and he would like to get some treasure from the next chamber, preferably the magic items.

Through a door at the end of the last chamber, there is the captain's quarters. He is talking to the quarter master and first mate (if they are still alive). The captain fights to the death and has 9in a chest in the room,300gp per player and a trident of fish command (or other magic items).

You can progress this adventure in multiple ways, such as a pirate adventure where the players take control of the ship, or they could be hired by the sheriff again. You can decide!
