LEGO ROBOTS IN SCIENCE



Science teacher Mr Lawson has recently created an amazing club for year 10s. It is called LEGO robots. In this article we will tell you information about the club, we will be getting a sneak peek at the Lego robot designs and we will be interviewing one lucky year 10 who is a member of the club.

Located in science 2 every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday every lunch, a handful of year 10s meet up and work towards the creation of sophisticated robots, made out of lego! The robots themselves are made out of 100% Lego but some have technology inside that lets the year 10s code what they are meant to do. They do this with an app created by lego called, Lego education.

But why are they doing this. Obviously it is fun to create cool things like this but the students are competing against local schools from Buxton and Hope. Sometime in February, the year 10s at Lego robots club will go on a school trip and meet their competition at the rival schools. The robots will then be shown to a referee. This referee will then award each robot from each school points based on how many challenges the robot completes. The students are aware of these challenges beforehand so when creating the robots they have these challenges in mind.

Unfortunately, I am not allowed to show any of our school's robots since it may give an unfair advantage to the rival schools if they looked at this paper, but we can assure you they look cool! Nevertheless, the picture opposite is of past competitions that have taken place (not from our school).

Finally, we interviewed one of the year 10s who regularly attend LEGO robots: Toby Mackey.

Q: How long have you been doing LEGO robots for?

A: Since it began, about midway through October

Q: How did you find out about this amazing club?

A: Mr Lawson told me.

Q: On a scale on 1 to 10, how tricky is it to code some of the robots

A: Obviously they are all different but on average it would be a 5. The coding software is similar to scratch

Q: How many people go to LEGO robots club?

A: about 20

Q: Do you think that you are going to beat the other schools you are competing against?

A: Yes, easily

So, there you have it! Lego robots is a cool group that creates advanced machines out of Lego with the purpose to show it off to competing rival schools!

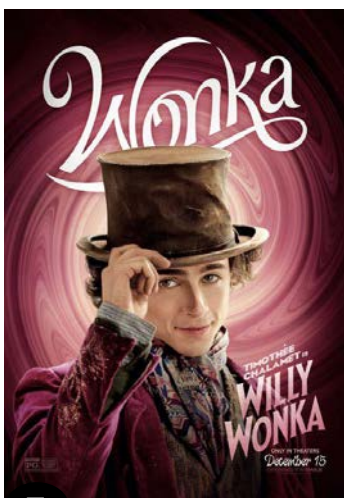
On Thursday this amazing pile of food will be donated to our local food bank. Thank you to all students, parents and staff who took their time to donate an item this year. It really does make a difference.

HERITAGE RAILWAY BREAKS A WORLD RECORD!

NEW COACHES! ON LINBURG?

Recently, the 42 bus and later some other bus services, ran by Linburg, have been changed from single decker (43 seats) to a coach (70 seats), this means that the 42 bus is now less crammed and next year, new students can use the 42 instead of the 42A. But, we still have the problem of the double decker buses, these buses are from 1997 and constantly break down or are late. The answer is new buses. However, new buses are expensive. NEW ELECTRIFICATION ON THE LOCAL RAILWAY LINES

Recently the government have announced that the railway lines coming out of Manchester into Buxton, Sheffield and into the hope valley are all going to get electrified by 2025(although 2027 is the expected date) the Buxton line is big news for chapel because the Buxton line is the line that passes through chapel. The reason the electrification of the Buxton line is so important is because it will cut the journey time from 35 minutes to 15 minutes and also the current class 150s are horrible to ride on but the class 323s and class 195s are a very pleasant rider's experience.

Why should you take the train to school?

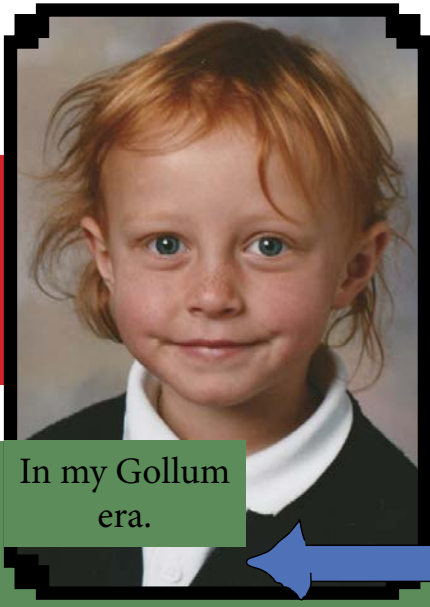
Well the answer is you shouldn't. Or is it? If you live in Whaley Bridge, new mills, Edale, Buxton, or anywhere in the surrounding area to chapel, you should take the train as it is quicker than the bus by far although the train station in chapel is just less than half a mile away but that is a 10 minute walk so not far at all. Once the new trains arrive and the line is electric, the total



journey time to get to school will be cut in half.

Is this improvement better for the local area?

Yes. Before the 1970s, chinley and chapel were some of the largest railway interchanges in Britain, coming close to the size of Manchester Piccadilly and the area was very rich. Currently, tourism in the area is growing and could definitely be improved by better railway infrastructure. Also, if the amount of tourists were to grow, the multiplier effect would take place. But tourism comes with its cons, first of all bigger brands would be attracted to come and sell their products in the smaller villages like Chinley, Edale and Buxwoth. Also like we have seen in castleton tourists can be very disturbing to the homeowners. But, money will be fed into our local area and for any homeowners, their houses value will go up because the homeowner would be able to rent-it-out.

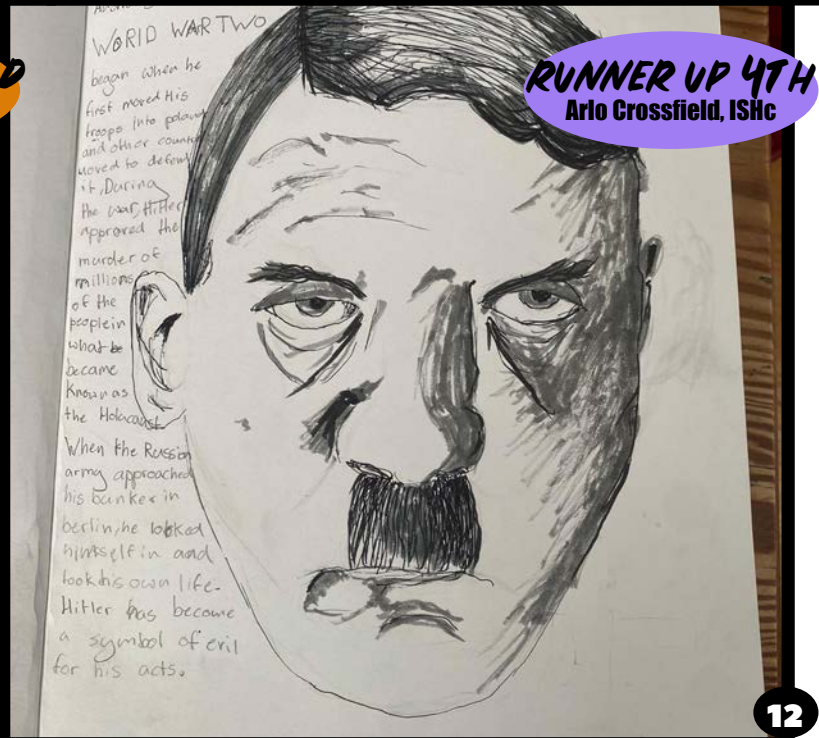
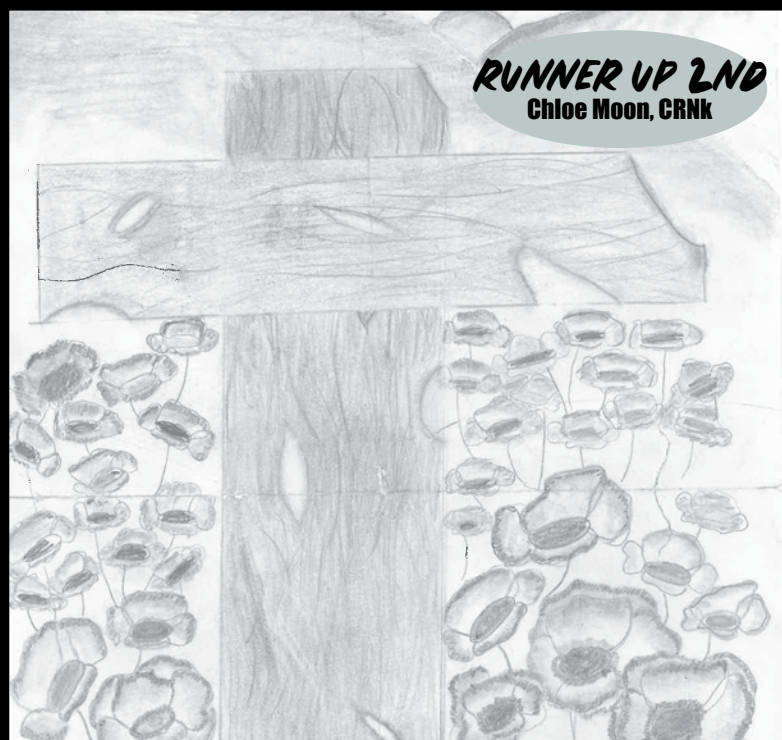
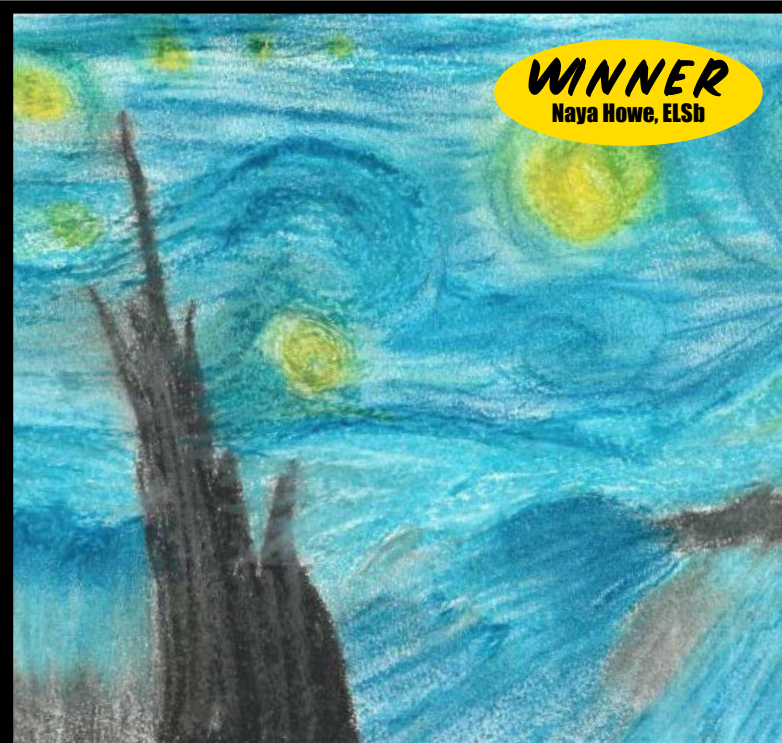
Historical was a difficult theme, I would say. But wow, the entries are so creative and explorative. We were really impressed with the entries, as always.

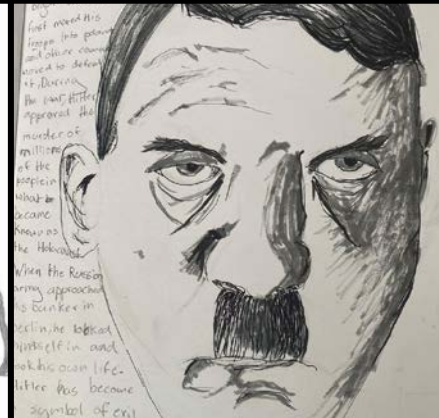

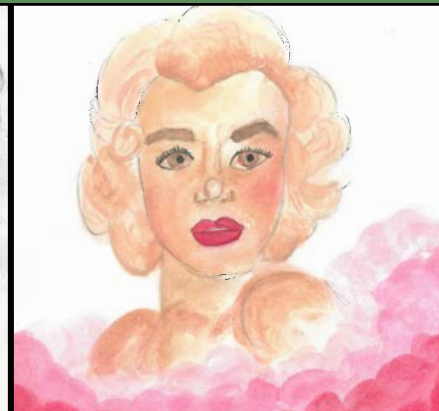

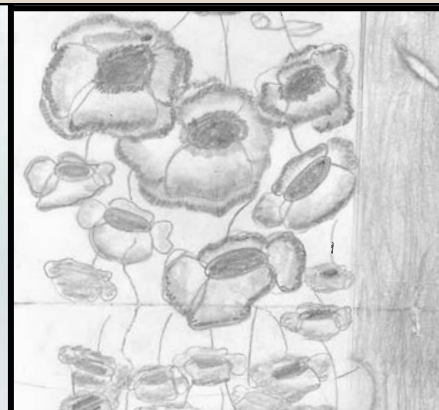

A COMPLETE HISTORY OF DUBSTEP WITH L3MM

Dubstep is one of the most influential, hardcore genres of EDM (Electronic dance music) and is very unique to other genres of electronic music. Dubstep was an offshoot of UK Garage and has elements of grime and drum'n'bass. The first proto-dubstep productions were around the millennium by producers like Oris Jay in the years 1999-2000.

Skream (pictured right) was one of the key producers and DJs during the dubstep movement. Oliver Dene Jones was key to the genre, releasing his first full length album, "Skream!" in 2006. American producer Skrillex emerged in the late 2000s and was a pioneer in the genre. He gained popularity rapidly, along with the genre itself.

SOUND

Dubstep consists of drum'n'bass samples and 808 kicks for the drumbeat, and a prominent bassline, which includes a huge characteristic of dubstep, wobble bass or wub, which is a very textured, fat bass. Chopped up vocals or vox are highly used along with synth pads. Dubstep has a dark tone, along with some euphoric sounds like vocal samples.

You can find a lot of different types of Dungeons and Dragons podcasts. The first style is a regular podcast. One I would recommend is 'Tales of the Stinky Dragon' by Roosterteeth.

The second style is one some people might like - Pokemon DND. If you like Pokemon or DND, or both, you will probably like this. There are two podcasts (and others) that relate to this that I would recommend, these are: Boarding Party, Dunsparce and Drampa.

The third style is a style of universe travelling. In this style you could be choosing to be travelling time, space and universes or you could be sucked into a universe in a game, or a world or maybe sucked into the past or future. These can take place in Jurassic time periods, or Victorian, etc.

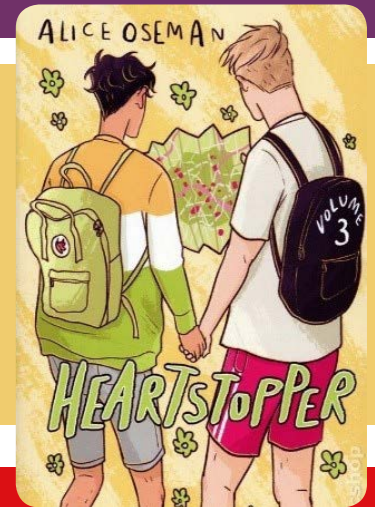

Five Nights at Freddy's (or FNAF for short) is a horror game that has books too. 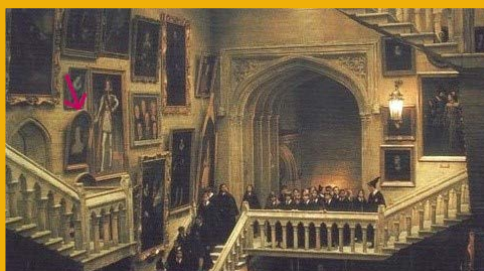
If you look closely at the background of the duel scene in Chamber of Secrets, you can see the moment the camera person gets caught in the film!

In the Prisoner of Azkaban, when Harry first encounters Buckbeak, you can see he does a poo right before Harry approaches him. He couldn't hold it in!

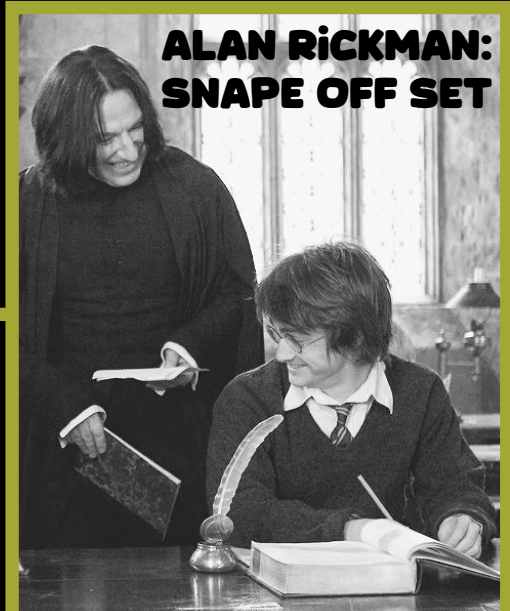

ALMOND BISCUITS RECIPE

Ingredients:

- 6 ounces of ground almonds
- 6 ounces of caster sugar
- 2 egg whites, lightly beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon of almond essence
- Whole almonds to garnish

Line 2 trays (approx. 33 x 23 cms.) with non-stick baking paper

2. Pre-heat the oven to 180oC [350oF, Gas Mark 4]

3. Mix all the ingredients (except the whole almonds) together.

4. Form the mixture into small balls., with your hands (a sticky job!!)

5. Flatten the balls slightly when you put them on the trays, leaving room in between them, and put a whole almond on top of each.

6. Bake for 15 minutes and allow to cool on the trays.
