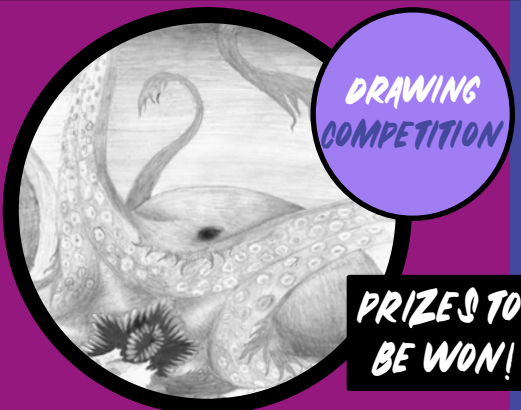

YEAR 10 TRIP TO THE HIGH PEAK JOBS & APPRENTISHIPS FAIR

On Friday 29th September, a group of year 10 girls accompanied by Mr Olinski and me, made the short journey to the Pavillion Gardens, Buxton. We were off to visit the third annual High Peak Jobs & Apprenticeship Fair. Local businesses came together to provide a valuable opportunity to help hundreds of people discuss employment and training opportunities, including pupils from all the local schools.

There were 73 local employers ranging from small local engineering companies, care homes, pubs, hotels, shops and salons, to large multi-national employers like Google and Barclays bank. The pupils visited as many stalls as they could, they talked to the employers and local colleges, they discussed work experience and apprenticeship opportunities with Derbyshire Police, the NHS, Nestle and Tarmac. Some even signed up to an apprenticeship information mailing list with Kwik-Fit. All the employers were keen to attract our pupils to their work force in the future and they are especially keen to increase the number of females into professions that are sometimes seen as male dominated. It was great to see how many opportunities are available in the local area, and how these could lead to careers further afield. All the girls said that they really valued the morning and enjoyed the experience - and they came away with tons of free stuff!

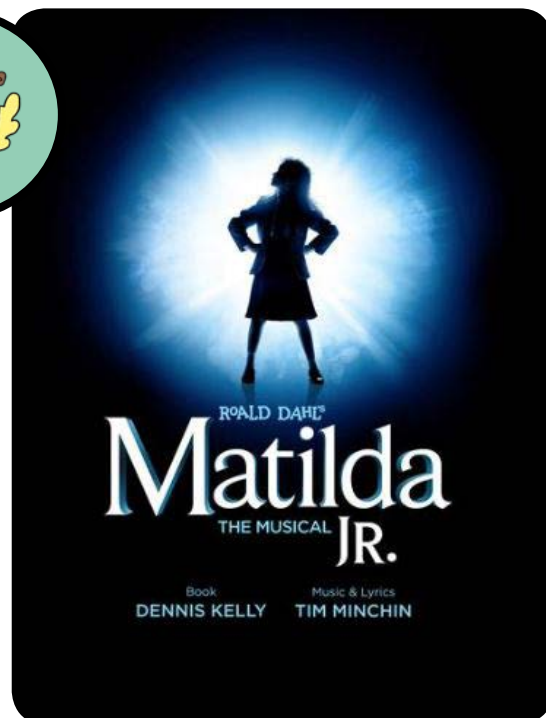
MATILDA JUNIOR REHEARSAL UPDATE

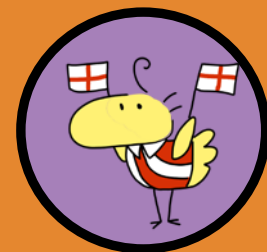

SPORT UPDATES

We are always very proud of the achievements of our sporting students and this update is no different. We have been incredibly impressed with the large number of students who have taken part in clubs and teams so far this term. We have had a range of success at local, county and national level in many different sports. For regular updates, follow us on Twitter (@ChapelHighPE), but here is a summary of our success over the past couple of weeks.

FOOTBALL

The football season has started with a mixed bag of results. Our year 7 football team were narrowly defeated by a strong Buxton side, but there were lots of positives to take in to the rest of the fixtures. The year 8 and KS4 teams were also beaten by Buxton in their High Peak league fixtures. Our Derbyshire Champions from last season have started the way they finished last season, picking up a very comfortable (8-1) win against Buxton in the league and recording an emphatic 9-2 victory away to Manchester Grammar School in the ESFA National Cup. Alfie Leech has registered eight goals in two games so far this season, Joel Tidmarsh with an early contender for goal of the season with his stunning strike against MGS.

The Year 7 Girls were in action at Buxton Community School last month in their first game representing their school. Chapel started the game off strong with 2 goals in the 1st half. The 2nd half was a tougher test for Chapel, with Buxton making several changes at half time however, Chapel came out on top, winning the game 3-1 with Ellie D scoring all 3 goals.

Our U16 girls took part in the KS4 County Girls' Competition at Moor Farm Training Ground. Chapel struggled in their 1st group game drawing 1-1 to Anthony Gell after going a goal down early on. In the 2nd group game, chapel took on Chellaston, winning the game comfortably 3-0, the 3rd goal was an impressive long-range strike from Lily B into the corner. Chapel played Derby Moor in the final group game, requiring a victory to progress to the next round of the competition. The girls were impressive and scored 2 early goals in the game and seeing out a 2-0 win. This resulted in Chapel coming 1st in the group and progressing to the semi-final stage. The team were drawn against John Port in their semi-final and competed in a very close contest, Chapel had the majority of the chances including hitting the post twice however, failed to score resulting in a penalty shootout. Unfortunately, the girls fell short losing 2-1 on penalties. The team can hold their heads high reaching the semi-finals in the Derbyshire County Tournament.

“We recently welcomed visitors from our Danish partner school, Frederikssund Private Realskole (FPR). FPR is situated just 30 miles west of Denmark’s capital, Copenhagen. As part of their English studies, all students in FPR’s 8th grade (year 10) participate in a two-week visit to the High Peak, during which they each spend 4 days with either Hope Valley College, Buxton Community School, or us. On their non-school days, they take part in outdoor activities around the Peak District and go on excursions to local attractions.

This year we welcomed 32 Danish students across 8 days. Each Danish student was “buddied up” with one of our year 10 students, with whom they attended lessons and took part in a range of activities. Our art and science departments were also kind enough to deliver bespoke practical lessons to our guests.

In the first week, we hosted our annual International Sports Evening, which saw over 150 students from all four participating schools compete in netball, football, and tug-of-war, while some of FPR’s students attempted to teach us how to play handball!

In the second week, we hosted our buddy quiz night at school and FPR hosted the highly-anticipated and super-fancy gala party at the Palace Hotel in Buxton.

Overall, it was another brilliant two-week visit and we have absolutely loved hosting our Danish friends once again. We believe this is an invaluable experience for all of our students who take part and we would like to thank our buddies once again for being so warm and welcoming. If any year 9 students reading this would like to be an international buddy next year... watch this space!”

All of our Year 7s went on a field trip to Castleton last week to see first-hand what they have been learning about in their Geography classes. They have been studying geology and national parks and the trip allowed them to go underground to see some of the interesting features they have been hearing about at school.

The coach dropped the group off at the top of the broken road by Blue John Cavern and the students took in some great views of Mam Tor. The next stop was an underground tour at Treak Cliff Cavern which is famous for its unique large deposits of Blue John Stone as well as some incredible stalactites. From here the students walked down into Castleton via the historic Odin Mine crushing circle to have lunch outside the visitor centre.

Later this year Year 7s will be studying the Norman Conquest and castle design in their History lessons, and Peveril Castle provided them with a great example of this on the trip. Some of our speedier walking groups also had a chance to go fossil hunting in Cave Dale.

Mr Sellers, Head of Geography, said: "I was really impressed with our Year 7 learners. The cavern staff commented on both how well engaged and how well behaved our students were. I'm really happy that our students got plenty out of it."

BOOK RECOMMENDATION

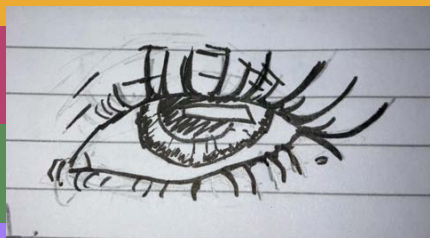

If you are looking for a new book to read this October, then I would really recommend A Good Girl's Guide to Murder. In the book we follow the main character Pip Fitz Amobi as she picks a six-year-old murder case for her end-of-school project, something just doesn't sit right with her.

The author (Holly Jackson) is 30 years old; she has two kids and is from England. She started to write the series in 2019 when she completed A Good Girl's Guide, then later finished the series with Killjoy in 2021. Her newest books are Five Survive and The Reappearance of Rachel Price which she portrayed in 2022 with the latter due in 2024.

A Good Girl's Guide To Murder is a book series that consists of 4 books, A Good Girl's Guide To Murder, Good Girl Bad Blood, As Good As Dead and Killjoy all of the books are a bit gory, so if you are sensitive to these topics I wouldn't recommend reading these books, some trigger warnings are, murder, drugs and gore. This book is intriguing and is based on a true story.

Isle of Dogs is a stop motion animated film, directed by Wes Anderson, who is most famously known for his other directorial work including Fantastic Mr. Fox. The film contains an action-packed story featuring five discarded hounds: Chief, Duke, King, Boss and Rex.

It's set 20 years in a dystopian future – Megasaki City, Japan

The storyline displays a displeased Mayor who plans to evacuate all dogs due to multiple spreading diseases – snout fever being most viral. Atari Kobayashi was heartbroken after his dog, Spots, was evacuated first. The young boy rebels and flies out to rescue his pup. A pack of dogs discover him and help him to fulfil his goal.

This is my favourite film because I appreciate the political view and I enjoy the animation style. I have been a fan of Wes ever since I was young. This film is INCREDIBLE and I would recommend it to anyone and everyone.

MUSIC THROUGH THE AGES

1950S

The 1950s was a decade of diverse musical styles and genres, such as rock 'n' roll, traditional pop, country, and rhythm and blues. Some of the most popular artists at the time were Elvis Presley, Frank Sinatra, and Johnny Cash. The notable change of the mid-1950s was the impact of American rock and roll, which provided a new model for performance and recording.

Some well-known tunes from the 1950s are: Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer (1950) Mr. Sandman (1954) Jailhouse Rock, Elvis Presley (1957).

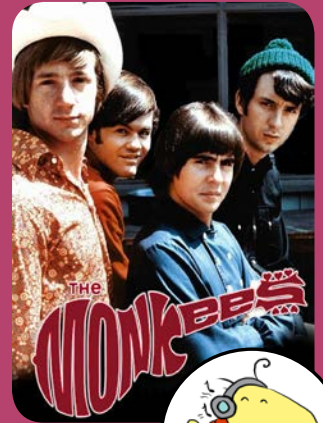


1960S

1960s music was an influential decade that saw the rise of rock, soul, pop, reggae, and blues. The Beatles, The Rolling Stones, The Beach Boys, Bob Dylan and The Who were some of the most popular artists of the decade.

The Sound of Music was the biggest album of 1965, spending 29 weeks at the top of the charts.

Some well-known tunes from the 1960s are: Yesterday, The Beatles (1965), I am a Believer, The Monkees (1966), Hey Jude, The Beatles (1968)



1970S

There was more variety in music in the 1970s than ever before. Music listeners had dozens of genres to choose from and many of them rose to popularity at different points during the decade. Funk, Soul, R&B, Pop, Hard Rock, Soft Rock, and Disco all carved out their place in the music world in the 1970s. The late 70s also witnessed the birth of another young music style: hip-hop.

The 70s were a golden era for vinyl records. They were affordable for everyone, and everyone had a record player. It seems like every song ever made in the 80s had a 70s sample in it.

Some popular tunes from 1970 include: Ain't No Mountain High Enough, Diana Ross (1970), How Deep is Your Love, Bee Gees (1977), Stayin' Alive, Bee Gees (1978), You are The One That I Want, John Travolta & Olivia Newton-John (1978), I Will Survive, Gloria Gaynor (1979)



1980S

More than anything, eighties music was heavily produced. Everyone knows the classic 80s sound: huge reverby snare drums, lots of delay on the vocals, electronic rhythms, and synthesizers.

The music industry in the 1980s was driven mostly by the success of a wildly popular new music cable channel called MTV. For the first time in history, image was just as important as music. A good music video could instantly catapult a new act to stardom. Cyndi Lauper was an overnight sensation due to her quirky looks as much as her quirky tunes.

Some artists were huge for most of the decade. Madonna, Michael Jackson, Def Leppard to name a few. Cher made a comeback and Guns N' Roses made a grand introduction.

Many popular hits were released in the 1980s. These include: Another One Bites the Dust, Queen (1980), 9 to 5, Dolly Parton (1981), , Take On Me, a-ha (1985), True Colours, Cyndi Lauper (1986) Never Gonna Give You Up, Rick Astley (1988).

1990S

Music in the 1990s was truly inspired. So many great, timeless songs were written and recorded by so many diverse types of artists, it is impossible to list. Every other week a new genre popped up. First it was Alternative, then SkaPunk, then Fusion, then Rap Rock — you get the idea. Musicians were blending styles like never before, aided by the affordability of digital recording equipment that could now operate in the artists' homes. Popular music in the 1990s include: Ice Ice Baby, Vanilla Ice (1990) I Will Always Love You, Whitney Houston (1992) Waterfalls, TLC (1995) My Heart Will Go On, Celine Dion (1998) ...Baby One More Time, Britney Spears (1999).



2000S

From chart-topping ballads to infectious dance tracks, R&B in the 2000s represented a dynamic and diverse landscape of musical expression. The most recognized female singer of the 2000s is Britney Spears, who has a number of major hits right at the turn of the millennium. An event in 2009 happened which many people remember. It was the moment in which Kanye West stormed the VMAs stage as Taylor Swift attempted to accept her award for Best Video by a Female Artist and told her, "I'mma let you finish, but Beyoncé had one of the best videos of all time! One of the best videos of all time!" Many people think of the early 2000s as a pop music decade, but that is not entirely accurate. While pop music was popular, there were also many other genres that were thriving.

Some of these hits are: Can We Fix It? Bob the Builder (2000), Lose Yourself, Eminem (2002), Umbrella, Rihanna (2007), Just Dance, Lady Gaga (2009)



2010S

The 2010s was a decade of musical diversity and innovation, influenced by the rise of streaming services and social media platforms. Some of the dominant genres were dance-pop, electronic dance music, electropop and hip-hop. Songs became shorter, genres blended, and language barriers dissolved. Some new or emerging genres were vapor-wave, lo-fi hip hop and bedroom pop. These are some of the most popular tunes from the 2010s: Just The Way You Are, Bruno Mars (2010) Someone Like You, Adele (2011) What Makes You Beautiful, One Direction (2011) Somebody That I Used To Know, Gotye ft. Kimbra (2012) Payphone, Maroon 5 (2012) Little Things, One Direction (2012)



2020S

The 2020s in music are marked by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the rise of streaming services, and the diversity of genres and artists. Some of the most popular songs of 2020 were Blinding Lights by The Weeknd, do not Start Now by Dua Lipa, and Watermelon Sugar by Harry Styles.

Here are the most popular songs of 2020s: Blinding Lights, The Weeknd (2020) Before You Go, Lewis Capaldi (2020) No Time To Die, Billie Eilish (2020) Toosie Slide, Drake (2020) Driver's License, Olivia Rodrigo (2021).

Fun Fact! Wham's song 'Last Christmas' reached number 1 in 2022, the first time since its release, in 1984.



ELECTRONIC DANCE MUSIC

Electronic dance music is one of the most popular genres in modern music. Starting with 1970s New York disco, it has evolved into many different genres including dubstep, electro, techno and house.

TECHNO

Techno was born in Germany in the early 1980s and is characterized by a four-on-the-floor beat and 130-150 BPM. Drum machines like the Roland TR-909 and synthesizers like the Korg-M1 are highly used in techno. Early musicians and bands such as Kraftwerk started an early version of synthesizer rock which evolved into early techno.

ELECTRO

Electro started in the mid-1980s with samplers, processed vocals and the Roland TR-808 drum machine. Juan Atkins was highly influential, making a number of electro records.

TRANCE

Trance started in Frankfurt, Germany and is characterized by a tempo of 120-150 BPM and euphoric synthesizers and pads. The reverb effect is highly used in trance, and artists like Mangoo and Darude in the early 2000s released global hits which defined the genre entirely.

HOUSE

House is a genre which is widely known for a four-on-the-floor kick and the Roland TR-909 drum machine. House started with Frankie Knuckles, Farley Funk and Jesse Saunders in Chicago, USA. In the early 1980s. There are quite a few subgenres including Acid House (A subgenre where the TR-303 bassline is widely used), Deep House (Sounds somewhat like trance) and disco house (self-explanatory).

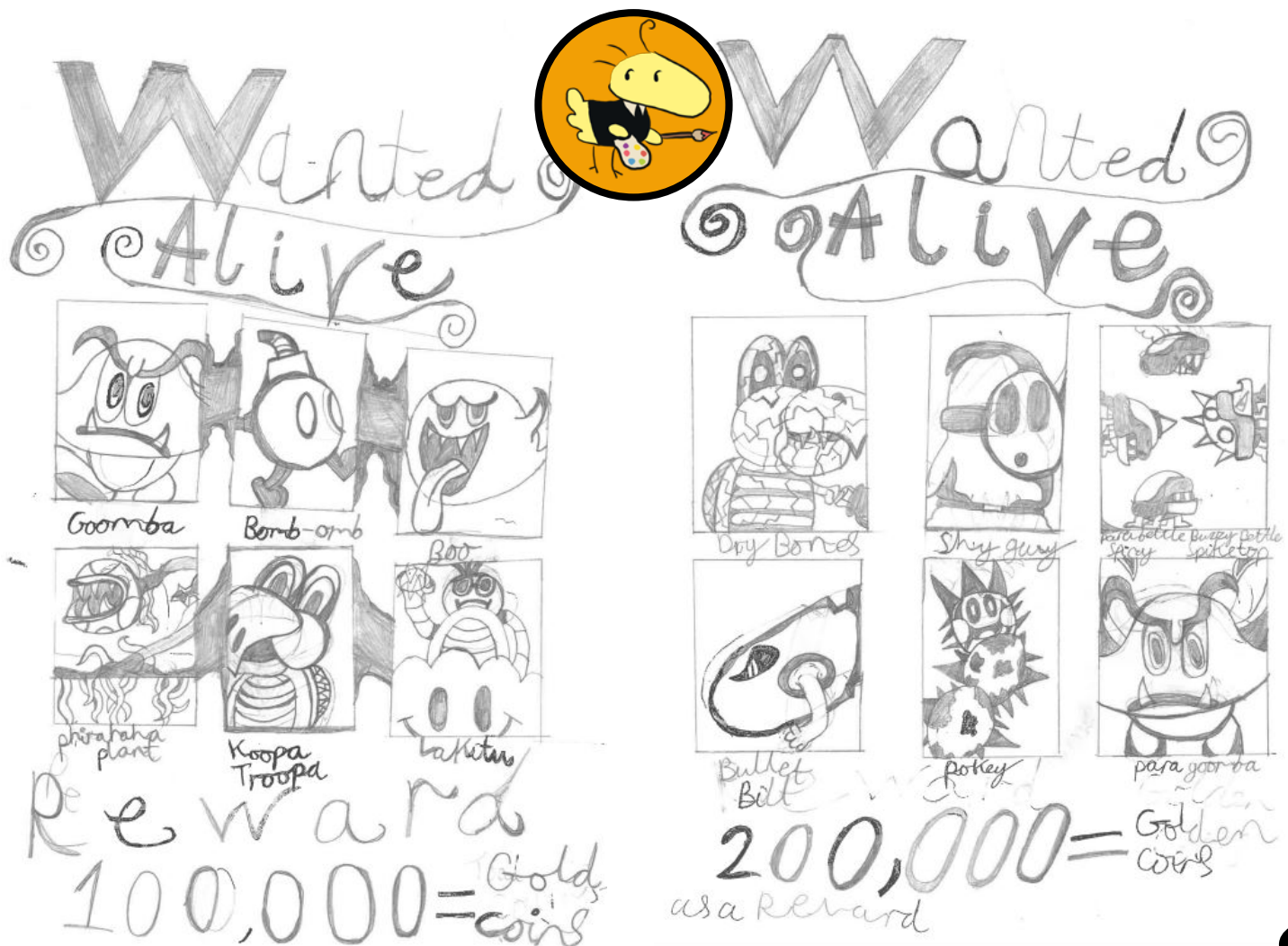

COCONUT BROWNIE RECIPE

From BBC GoodFood,

Ingredients:

- 100g cocoa powder
- 250g butter
- 500g golden caster sugar
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 100g self-raising flour
- 100g desiccated coconut
- Icing sugar to dust (optional)

Method:

1. Heat oven to 180C. Line the base of a 21cm square tin with baking parchment. Put the cocoa powder, butter and sugar in your largest saucepan and gently melt, stirring so the mixture does not catch. When the cocoa mixture is melted and combined, cool slightly, then stir in the eggs, little by little, followed by the flour and coconut.

2. Tip into the tin and bake for 45 mins on a middle shelf – check after 30 mins and cover with another piece of baking parchment if the crust is browning too much. Cool in the tin, then carefully lift out and cut into squares.

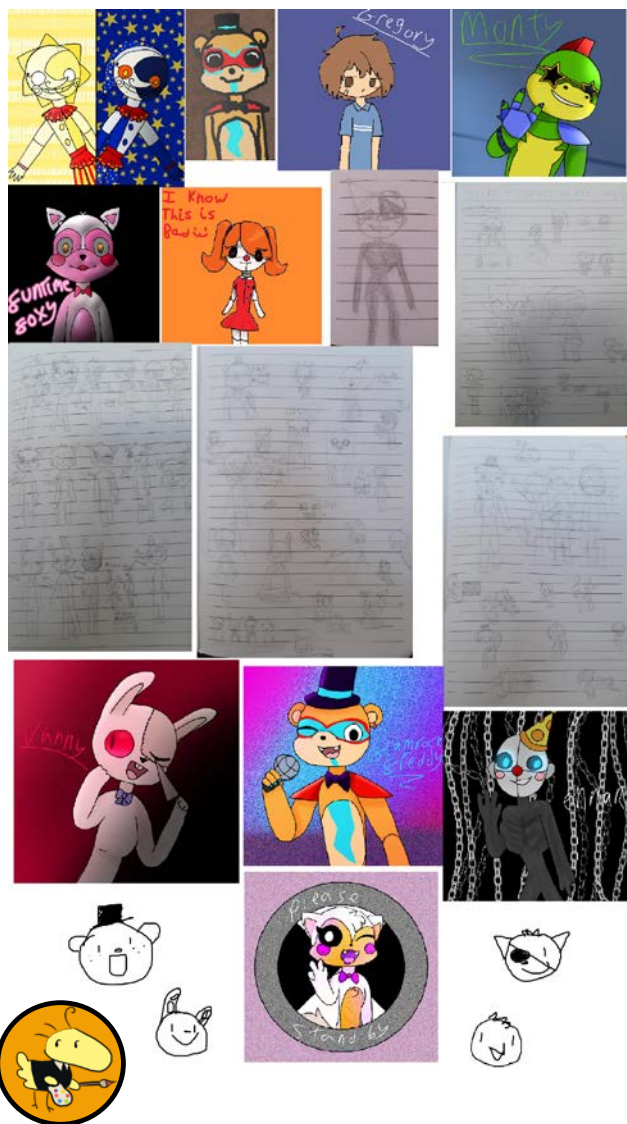
