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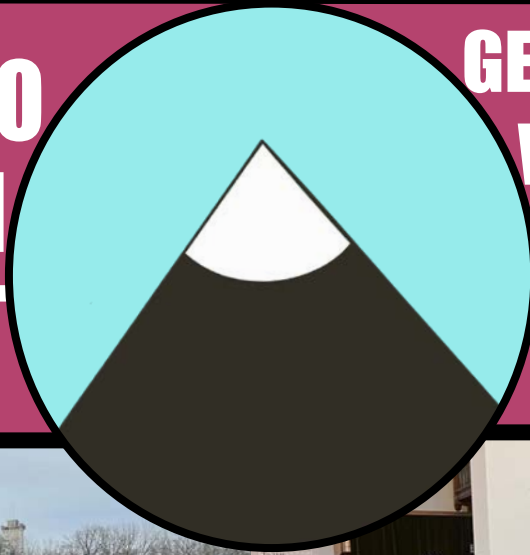

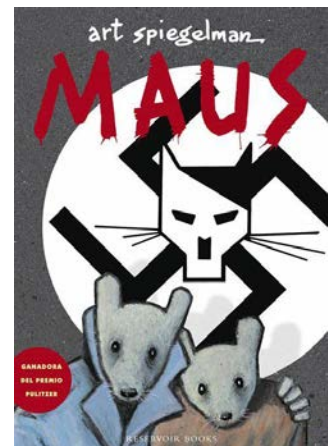
Phil Earle Visits Our Library

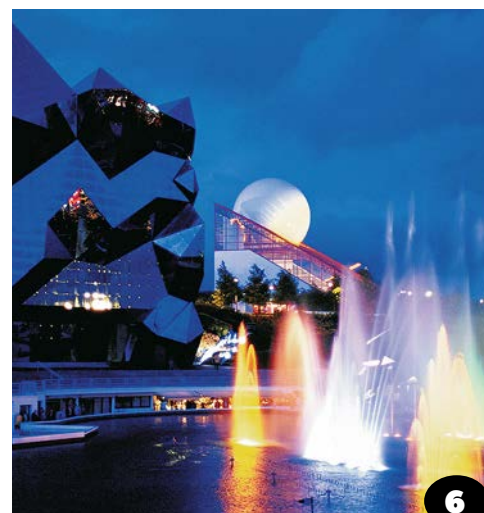

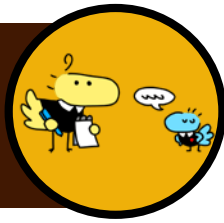
DAY TWO : FUTUROSCOPE THEME PARK

Q: What is your favourite play that you've done at school?

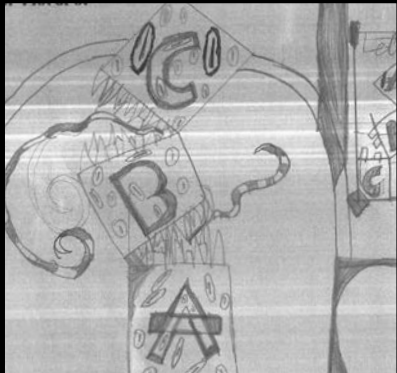

This term we have seen some amazing work from our students. Eden and Will, the creators of the drawing competition, had a tough job choosing our winner and runners up.

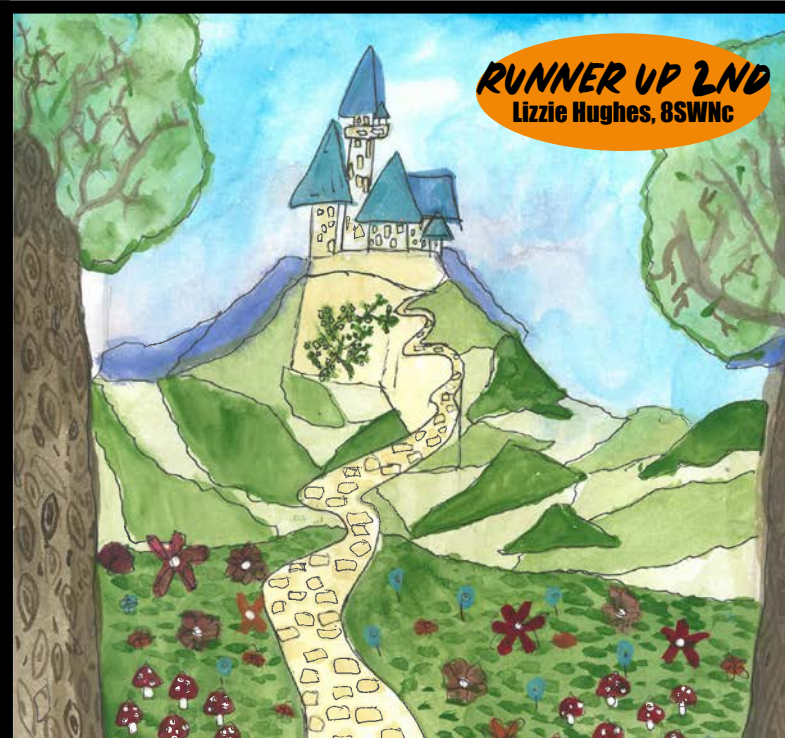

Well done to all of them! Hopefully, this will give them the confidence to share their talent and take part in many more performances in the near future.



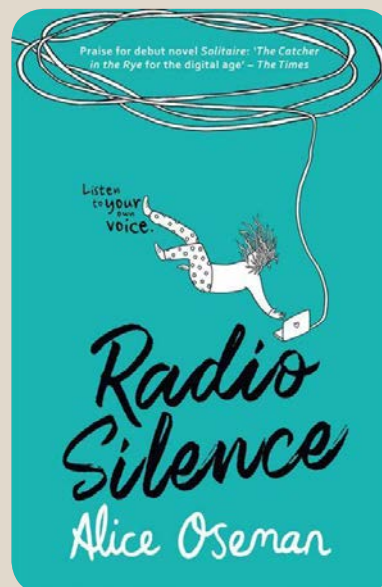

Radio Silence is a wonderful book, written by Alice Oseman, the creator of the Heartstopper series. It is a great book for people who love solving mysteries! It is quite a lengthy book, reaching almost 500 pages, but it is definitely worth a read. HONOUR AMONG THIEVES

'Honor Among Thieves' is an Adventure/Action film that came out on 31st March 2023. It is based very loosely on the famous Role-Playing Game, Dungeons and Dragons (D&D), which is the same as the game they played in Stranger Things. It follows a group of adventurers as they try to rescue someone from evil wizards. This article will go over all the mistakes that they made, and the things they did well, according to the rules of the game. Even if you have no idea what D&D is, you do not need to play the game to enjoy the film, as on its own, it does a good job of explaining what is going on.



If you have seen the film, you will know that when Doric (the Druid) first comes on screen, she is transformed into a horse. When the combat starts, she transforms again, but into another monster, later referred to as an Owlbear. Although this monstrosity is a monster you can fight in D&D, it is not one Druids can transform into. Later, she goes into Neverwinter Arena, to spy on the magical defenses. As she is leaving the city, she transforms multiple times, into a few different kinds of animals, such as a mouse, a cat, an eagle, and a deer. Druids, unless they are higher level, can only transform into 2 different creatures every day, meaning that, although the sequence looked really good on screen, it is not very accurate. Despite all this, the Druid is not my biggest gripe over the whole film, as there is an updated version of D&D coming out in the near future which may add these features in for Druids.

Another thing that the film didn't do like the game was Edgin (Chris Pine's character). In the film, he is presented quite close to a D&D class called the bard. This class uses songs, and other spoken arts to cast spells. The problem here is that Edgin never casts spells, and does more sneaking around, planning, and stealing. Judging by everything he does, apart from play the lyre, he is more closely associated with the Rogue class. If they were trying to represent one over another, they should really have tried to focus on one class. If they wanted him to be a Bard, let him cast spells, and if he is a Rogue, give him a dagger!

On the other hand, one of the things they did well was the way they made the plot based on multiple locations. In an average D&D Campaign, you will be exploring lots of different places along the way, trying to find a part of a puzzle, a new item, or slay a specific enemy. During the movie, the characters went to different locations, such as the site of a battle, a prison, the Underdark, and, of course, Neverwinter. This made it feel like it was an actual campaign that some people could play through, rather than a film that added D&D to it for extra views. As well as this, it is obviously set in The Forgotten Realms, a published world to set adventures in. The designers introduced the setting very subtly, so that only people who play the game know that it is there, and it does not detract from the experience that everyone else would have. Together, it made it seem more rooted somewhere, than if it had D&D tagged on the side.

Another key inclusion that kept the show true to its roots are some of the monsters, and other characters, that appeared throughout the movie, but especially during the scene where they are trapped in the colosseum. There were three separate kinds of monsters that fans could see in the Labrinth, a Mimic, a Displacer Beast, and a Gelatinous Cube. The producers could have used any kind of monster from the game, but these three are the most iconic. Along with the monsters, if you look closely at the other teams they are racing against, there is one made up of characters from the cartoon. These cartoons were made decades ago, but it was a little easter egg for most long-term fans.

In conclusion, I think the film was an accurate representation of D&D as fans know it, due to the monsters, backstory, and other important factors. The small added details, that only some people can spot are what really makes it fit in. Even if you have no idea what D&D is, you do not need to play the game to enjoy the film, as on its own, it does a good job of explaining what is going on. If you want to play the game, there is a club in school that has campaigns running every Thursday after school, until 4:15, in the library!

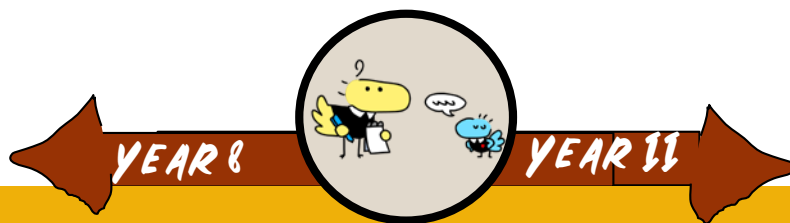

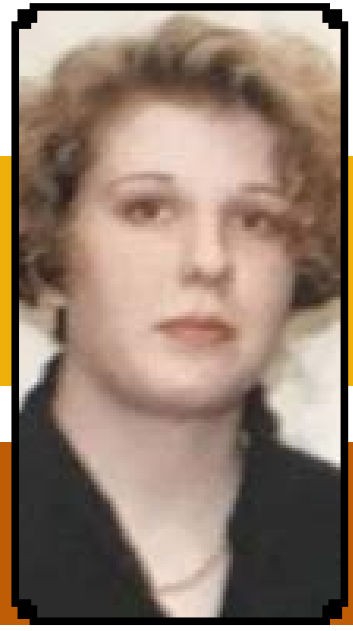

My original recipe used lamb mince, and was delicious, but since lamb meat is not particularly good for the environment, I decided to use chicken mince instead.

Ingredients:

- 550g of minced chicken
- 2 garlic cloves – finely chopped
- A thumb-sized piece of ginger – peeled and finely chopped
- A good handful of fresh coriander - finely chopped
- 4 spring onions – finely chopped
- A handful of breadcrumbs
- 1 small egg
- ¼ tsp of chili flakes
- ¼ tsp cayenne pepper
- Half a stick of celery – finely chopped

To serve (all are optional):

- Sliced tomatoes
- Some leaves of your choice
- Mayonnaise
- Sweet chili sauce

Instructions

Method:

Step 1: Squish together all the ingredients excluding the breadcrumbs and egg.

Step 2: Add sufficient egg and breadcrumbs to the mixture until it starts to resemble dough.

Step 3: Fry in a non-stick pan until cooked through. Cut into the largest burger to ensure it is fully cooked.

Step 4: Enjoy!

On the second Saturday of every month, at the canal basin in Whaley Bridge, the FAB (Food and Arts at the Basin) market is held. Local people from the High Peak come together to sell their products.

Stop-Motion Written by Sophie Pomeroy

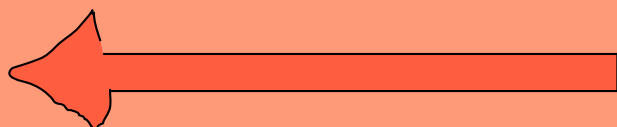


Recently, when at a friend's house, they introduced me to stop-motion animation. I have made several short films already, and even though it is a lengthy process, I really enjoy it. However, it is not as easy as it seems, so if you do ever decide to take up animation, I have some advice.

My first tip for stop-motion animation is to try and keep your phone or camera steady when taking each photo. Even though it may look the same when the photo is taken, each tiny movement will seem to cause very shaky camera movement when watching your film back. A wonderful thing to help solve this issue is a tripod, because it keeps whatever you are using to take pictures with steady. If you don't have a tripod, something like a cardboard box or a stack of books will suffice.

When moving objects between shots, only make exceedingly small movements. If you make too big a movement, the resulting film will look jumpy and fake. The ideal result is for the film to look smooth and lifelike.

Overall, I would definitely recommend trying animation, because even though it takes a long time, and has its challenges, if done properly, the end result is worth all the hard work that went into it.
